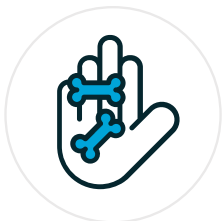

Outdoor barking

One of the most common reasons dogs bark a lot in their yards is because of the vantage point of what they can see. For example, in the yard dogs can see everyone that walks past, other animals, vehicles, and the postman. If dogs aren't appropriately exposed to these things or taught at a young age, they will be very inclined to bark and rush up to the fence each time.

DIY training solutions



Rewards

Spend time with your dog in the front yard. Every time someone or one of those triggers goes past the property, say 'good boy/girl' and give your dog a treat.



Location

When you're not home, lock up your dog away from the stimulus. They'd be far better in a smaller space such as dog run or a nice comfy part of the house.



Fulfillment

Make sure your dog is sufficiently fulfilled. Take your dog for a run, play a game of fetch, or a short walk around the block will be enough to make your dog relaxed.



Fencing

A quick solution is to double over shade sails or other opaque materials to cover up the fence so the dog can't see through to the triggering stimulus.
